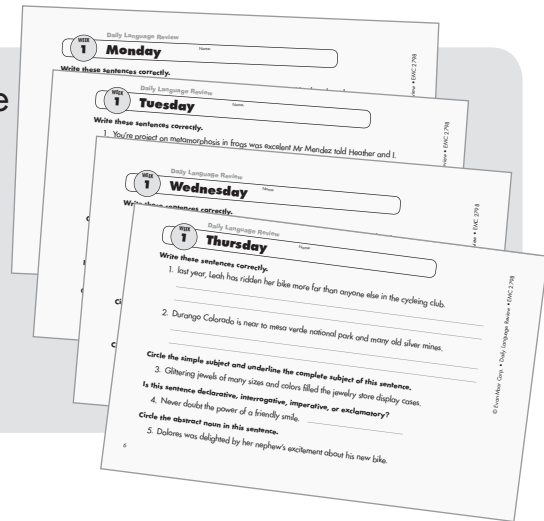

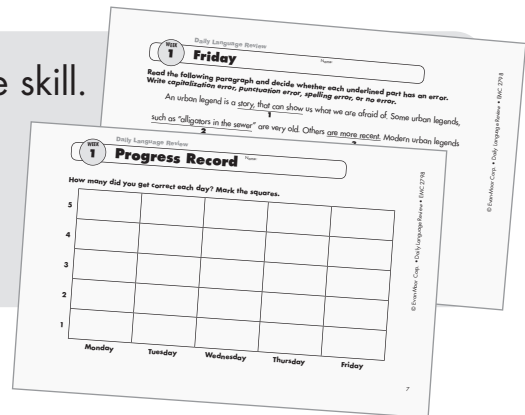
Monday through Thursday
